

## MVD Procedural Quick Update

**RE: Temporary (10- or 30-day) Driver Permits**  
**Effective date: Immediate**

*[This is the latest in a series of procedural updates. These updates deal with specific MVD procedures and practices. Managers and Supervisors should consistently distribute the updates to all personnel and integrate them into regular information and training sessions.]*

**There are two temporary driver permit forms currently in use: yellow form 10111 and red-and-white form 11067.**

**Effective immediately, form 10111 permits are to be issued ONLY by the Drivers Section in Santa Fe for individuals who are out of state and need a temporary extension of an expiring driver's license. Field offices should return any unused forms to Drivers Services in Santa Fe.**

**Field offices may continue to use the red and white form 11067 for customers who need a temporary permit pending clearance of a driver's license or completion of a DWI information and education course.**

**Note: Temporary permits may never be issued to commercial drivers. There is currently no such thing as a temporary New Mexico CDL permit.**

The yellow form 10111 permits were authorized in 2004 for use by the field offices when the SSOLV (Social Security Verification System) returned a "no match" code for name or date of birth. The temporary permit gave the customer time to resolve the problem with the Social Security Administration prior to issuance of a regular license.

However, the availability of the Social Security override function has eliminated the need for this use of a temporary permit. Field offices should immediately return all unused yellow forms 10111 to MVD-Drivers Services, P.O. Box 1028, Santa Fe, NM 87504-1028.

Neither the Social Security override function nor the temporary permit may be used for a commercial driver. There is currently no such thing as a temporary New Mexico CDL permit.

The red and white form 11067 will continue to be used by the field offices as a 10-day temporary permit pending clearance of a driver's license, or as a 30-day permit pending completion of a DWI information and education course.

The form 11067 10-day permit has also been used when a field office's EDL goes down with people's information in it. With the 10-day permit the customer can drive away and come back to have his or her picture taken when the EDL is functioning again.
